This Is How It Feels To Be Free

Matthew 18:21-35

Introduction:

The longer I am saved, and the longer I serve the body of Christ, the more convinced I am that one of the greatest needs we have is the need of forgiveness. I am not referring simply to the forgiveness that needs to be given to others, but to the need to forgive one's self as well.

Nothing reflects the new nature of the child of God any more than forgiveness. A person who forgives another person emulates the character of God. Likewise, a person who refuses to forgive is lacking in godly character and is without Christlike love. Truth is, Christians should forgive because they themselves need forgiveness. Forgiveness is a give-and-take part of life.

To claim that we understand what God did in Jesus Christ on the cross for us and then refuse to forgive those who have wronged us is to be no different than the lost world.
